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## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### Objectives and aims

The Charity's principal objective is to raise funds from subscriptions, donations, fundraising events and legacies to provide additional equipment and amenities for patients, visitors and staff of the NHS Trusts serving the communities of Brighton & Hove and Newhaven.

The objects of the Friends are:

- 1.To encourage, foster and maintain the interest of the public in the patients and staff and to support the work of the NHS Trusts serving the communities of Brighton, Hove and Newhaven (hereinafter referred to as 'NHS Trusts') by means of voluntary service.
- 2.To raise and collect funds and to apply them by supplementing in such manner as the Friends think fit the resources available to the NHS Trusts from public funds.
- 3.To recruit and assist in the recruitment of voluntary workers in and for the Friends and to provide a link between the NHS Trusts and the communities which they serve.
- 4.To co-operate with all other bodies for the benefit of the hospitals and community services.
- 5. To co-operate with other Friends of hospitals and other charitable bodies.
- 6.To do all things as are incidental or conducive to the attainment of the above objects or any of them.

In 2022 the NHS Trusts supported were:

- University Hospitals Sussex NHS Foundation Trust
- Sussex Partnership NHS Foundation Trust

#### Public benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives and in the planning of future activities.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities Introduction:

2022 has been a year of great changes.

The NHS has moved from focusing on the pandemic to trying to resume normal service, but with a backlog that is putting pressure on the system at every level.

In Sussex we have a new Trust - University Hospitals Sussex NHS Foundation Trust. With this comes a new structure for hospital charities and volunteering, affecting all Friends organisations. I am pleased to say that this seems to be working better than previously, with a real wish for us all to work more closely together in achieving what are common objectives.

Our own Friends group continues to focus on our main purpose - to make life better for people in hospital.

We have further expanded our Small Acts of Friendship project, which is now in eight wards in the Royal Sussex County Hospital and has benefited over 5,000 patients. We recently introduced a system where our SAF volunteer base can be supplemented by young volunteers in education - giving them valuable work experience, and the patients the benefits of their enthusiasm.

We have funded the Trust's first ever Sarcoma Nurse Specialist, to help treat patients with this form of cancer. We have also continued to support patients undergoing mental health treatment at Mill View Hospital, with outdoor leisure and fitness facilities to help their recovery. And, of course, we provide much needed hospital equipment such as an Ultrasound for the Sexual Health Clinic, allowing non-invasive diagnostic tests leading to faster patient treatment.

We will continue to ensure our funding goes to specific projects on the front line, where it is most needed. We are especially keen to fund areas that are lower profile, and do not already have charitable support.

We have been able to increase our fundraising activities, with an abseil down the i360, a tennisathon in Hove Park, pub quizzes, a wonderful wine tasting with Henry Butler and a sponsored sea swim.

Sea swimming is something we are getting more involved with. There are clear health and well-being benefits, and because of its increasing popularity, presents us with excellent partnership and fundraising opportunities. When the hospital site which is now the Royal Sussex County Hospital opened in 1828 it was called the Sussex County Hospital and Sea Bathing Infirmary, so we have a long history in this area, and will build on it in the coming years.

Many thanks to Katy Wells, our fundraiser, for all her hard work getting us back to a programme of fundraising events after two difficult and lean years.

Within the Charity we have also seen changes. After ten years our Chair Glynn Jones stood down. We are hugely grateful to him for his leadership and are delighted that he has agreed to remain as our Life President, so we will still have access to his guidance and support.

The new Trustee set up has allowed the charity to review our constitution, policies, procedures and accounting practices and make sure they are up to date and meet good practice guidelines. This has been led by Trustee Debbie Reeder, Treasurer Howard Kidd and Office Manager Suzy Horne. Many thanks for what was a lot of work.

Finally, more thanks. To our Patrons, Michael and Maureen Chowen, Sally Gunnell and Sir Anthony Seldon. To our wonderful Trustees, who give so much of their time and wisdom to help the charity flourish. And last, but certainly not least, all the people who are involved with Friends of Brighton & Hove Hospitals - our business partners, major sponsors, those who organise and take part in fundraising events, our donors, and especially all our wonderful volunteers. A special thank you to our volunteers at the Friends Café in the Park Centre for Breast Care.

Without all of you, and your support, none of what we do would be possible.

#### Investment policy and objectives

There are no restrictions on the Charity's power to invest. The investment strategy is set by the Trustees and takes account of recent demand for funds and the quality of the funding applications. In setting the investment strategy, the Trustees consider the income requirements of the Charity and the risk profile of the investments.

#### Reserves policy

It is the policy of the Charity to maintain unrestricted and unallocated funds, which are the free reserves of the Charity, at a level sufficient to cover future unrestricted expenditure. This provides funds to cover management and administration costs and to respond to applications for grants that arise.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Governing document

Friends of Brighton & Hove Hospitals is governed by a document first issued in 1949. The charity was registered with the Charity Commission for England and Wales on 22 September 1962.

In 2004 the charity title was changed from League of Hospital and Community Friends, Brighton, Hove and Newhaven to Friends of Brighton & Hove Hospitals.

In 2015 and 2019 changes were made to the rules on Trustee terms of office, membership, numbers required for a quorate General Meeting and to allow electronic communications.

#### Appointment of new Trustees

The constitution states there should be a maximum of fifteen members in total all of whom are elected (and for longer standing members, re-elected) at the Annual General Meeting.

New members may attend Committee meetings before being elected. Friends of Brighton & Hove Hospitals have a policy for the recruitment, selection and induction of members which is checked and approved by the Trustees every year. The Charity Commission leaflet CC3(A) is circulated to all new members.

The Friends have established a register of pecuniary interests and attendance at meetings and events is monitored.

#### Organisational structure

The Trustees are responsible for the management of the charity and will report on the year's work at the Annual General Meeting.

Further details are contained in the chairman's report.

### Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard FRS102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest  $\pounds$ .

The Trustees consider there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. Income from fundraising activities has reduced due to the Covid-19 pandemic and therefore steps taken to make cost savings. Trustees regard any impact to be short term rather than affecting the charity's ability to operate in the foreseeable future. There are no material uncertainties affecting the current year's accounts.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from donations is accounted for as received by the charity. The income from fundraising ventures is shown gross, with the associated costs included in fundraising costs. The value of voluntary work is not included in the financial statements.

For legacies, entitlement is taken on a case by case basis as the earlier of the date on which: the charity is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the charity that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably and the charity has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. If the legacy is in the form of an asset other than cash or an asset listed on a recognised stock exchange, recognition is subject to the value of the asset being able to be reliably measured and title to the asset has passed to the charity. Where legacies have been notified to the charity or the charity is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

#### Grants payable

Grants payable are included in the accounts when the obligation to make the payment arises. Any grants awarded, but unspent within two years are written back to be made available for future funding bids.

### Allocation and apportionment of costs

Staff costs have been allocated between grant making and other charitable activities according to the time spent by staff on each activity.

Other support costs attributable to each activity have been allocated on a direct cost basis or, for other overhead costs, apportioned according to management estimates.

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## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - continued FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### Expenditure

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets are depreciated so as to write off their cost over their useful economic lives at the following rates:

Office equipment - 15% straight line basis.

Tangible Fixed Assets costing more than £1,000 are capitalised and including any incidental expenses of acquisition.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

### Donated goods

Donated goods and services have not been recognised in these financial statements as it is not practicable to do so and the cost outweighs the benefit.
